Myasthenia Gravis

When Monroe Donathan asked if he could come speak to Rotary about Myasthenia Gravis I had to Google it. Myasthenia Gravis is an autoimmune neuromuscular disease that weakens the voluntary muscle groups, and Monroe has it. He was diagnosed in 1993, but probably had it three or four years beforehand. Myasthenia Gravis is one of 43 known neuromuscular diseases. It is more common in women under 40 and in men older than 60. It isn't curable, but it is treatable and 1 to 2 people in 15,000 have it. Symptoms include: Blurred or double vision; Slurred speech; Weakness in the arms or legs; Chronic muscle fatigue and difficulty breathing.

Domestic Violence The Ugly Side of Life

The answers to why one person would choose to hurt another, especially someone they vow to love, are many and varied. The consequences are painful - and all too often deadly. So it is within this environment that people like Sarah Carpenter protect and support women whose lives have taken a terrible turn. Mary Sue's Safe Haven opened in 2009, and even in Mayberry we find a need for this oasis of safety. Since its opening, 82 women and children have found refuge. Some have found the courage and strength to get away from their abusers, but for others that step seems too hard to take and they return, again and again. On average a woman will return seven times before the final break is made. These women need encouragement and support to break the cycle. No one deserves to be belittled, tormented, humiliated or hurt.

ShelterBox Haiti...six months later

ShelterBox's response to the Haiti earthquake has been the biggest, longest and most complex in the 10-year history of the international disaster relief charity.

The first ShelterBox Response Team (SRT) was mobilized 12 minutes after the earthquake struck. Now, six months later, 22,192 ShelterBoxes have

been delivered in Haiti, enough aid for more than 220,000 people. "This has been the most challenging disaster we've ever had to face. The scale of the destruction was beyond belief," said ShelterBox founder Tom Henderson.

More than 50 highly trained SRT members, from all walks of life, have now volunteered in Haiti for ShelterBox.

Tom Henderson added: "Our staff, volunteers and supporters the world over have worked tirelessly, with dedication, passion and commitment, to deliver emergency shelter and life-saving supplies to thousands of Haitian families. Wherever you look in Port-au-Prince you can see a ShelterBox tent.

"This wouldn't have been possible without the overwhelming generosity of our donors. The earthquake moved people to act, and act they have, in a way we have never witnessed before.

"During the coming months, we'll be sending another 5,000 ShelterBoxes to Haiti which will give families the safe, secure shelter they need to start rebuilding their lives."

PILOT MOUNTAIN PRIDE HOMEGROWN AND GROWING STRONGER

Chris Knopf, Assistant City Manager for Economic Development & Bryan Cave, Director - NC Cooperative Extension Services began tossing around the idea of "value added agriculture" in 2003. By 2008 with a lot more thought and input a plan was coming together and in February 2010 Pilot Mountain Pride – PMP was launched. Pilot Mountain Pride provides area farmers a place to take their produce, have it graded, washed and packaged for distribution to area restaurants, grocers and institutions. Lowes Foods has 15 Stores who are participating with PMP in this new endeavor. This is not an exclusive contract with Lowes, but they have been very supportive of the facility and willing to work with PMP to get locally grown produce into the hands of local restaurants and homeowners. PMP acts as the intermediary between the farmer and the market place. The farmer receives a check from PMP within days of delivering their goods.

According to Mr. Cave, there is now some talk about how PMP and the schools can work together. One idea is to encourage farming with students whose produce would then be sent to PMP for grading. This produce could then be sent back to the school cafeterias for making school meals. This is only one idea and there will be many, many more to come.
